# CE&SL Spanning Boundaries (SB) Challenge: **Grant & Submission Overview**

#### **AIM**

Advance institutional change in CE&SL in the UArizona learning experience, through collaborative innovation and scholarship in teaching and learning.

#### **RATIONALE**

Offer an opportunity to live up to our land grant and Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) missions on the Borderlands, with renewed commitment to the public good, teaching, learning, research and service

#### **APPROACH**

- Cross-disciplinary & cross-unit collaborations
- Alignment with the CUES mission
- Alignment with CE&SL recommendations
- Deliberate centering of UArizona institutional identities (borderland land grant, HSI, AA&U, R1)
- Consideration of University assets, resources, and needs

## CE&SL Spanning Boundaries (SB) Challenge: Grant & Submission Overview

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- Consider University assets, resources, and needs

#### **EXPECTED IMPACT**

- Spearhead sustainable, institutionally-backed innovation in university education
- Aligned with the mission of CUES: educational scholarship/research on teaching and learning (including outcomes and assessment) at UArizona

Proposals that intentionally build upon the University's institutional identities and values (e.g., inclusion, compassion, exploration) are encouraged.



# CE&SL Spanning Boundaries (SB) Challenge: **Grant & Submission Overview**

#### **FUNDING**

- One project will be selected and funded for up to two years, starting in Fall 2022
- Budget is not to exceed a total of \$100,000 over the duration of the project

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

- Call is open to cross-unit or cross-discipline University teams
- Teams must include 50% or more tenure-track, continuing-status track, or career-track faculty

#### **KEY DATES**

- Phase I: Pre-proposals due on February 14, 2022 by 11:59 pm
- Phase II: Full proposals (by invitation only) due on April 25, 2022

NOTE: invitations to submit for Phase II will be extended by March 3, 2022

## CE&SL Recommendations: Key Takeaways

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Civic engagement is about bridging; engagement requires community.

- Soto, 2021, February 2021 dual keynote

From this perspective, bridging within our own units, across faculty, staff, and students, and beyond the campus walls is critical for civic engagement.

Service Learning is a lens for transforming both how we teach and learn (pedagogy) and what we teach and learn (content)

- Pollack, February 2021 dual keynote

This lens suggests connecting across perspectives, integrating academic and civic learning, career and community, self and society.



## CE&SL Recommendations: **Key Takeaways**

#### **Embrace Critical Service Learning**

 We must move from a traditional approach – emphasizing service just as a pedagogy and discipline-based knowledge acquisition with little attention to the root causes of social inequality, to a critical approach - explicitly examining issues of social responsibility, social justice and systemic inequalities from the context of particulars field of study.

#### **Center lived experiences**

 It is important to center the lived experiences, knowledge, and concerns of students who come from the communities in which the engagement will occur – a deliberate intent to recognize and integrate the cultural histories and knowledges of students into teaching and learning both inside and outside of the classroom.

## Give community partners the space and opportunity to define what a commitment to their cause and organization must look like

Bidirectional relationships with communities - placing the power to define the scope and the terms
of the community engagement and service-learning opportunities in the hands of community
members who should benefit most from the exchange.



# SB Grant Preparation: **Proposal Design, Research** & **Institutional Impact**

### What examples of proposals are envisioned?

- Building CE&SL capacity among faculty and/or graduate student instructors through rigorous professional development and support for curricular implementation,
- Integrating CE&SL in a coalition of courses that share a common theme in terms of pedagogy and/or content, but come from different disciplines,
- Developing an intensive, multipronged CE&SL training program for a specific student group (e.g., transfer students, first-year graduate students), and
- Creating resources and strategies to promote CE&SL in research and other experiential settings.



CUES Mapping Educational Challenges Workshop on "Civic Engagement & Service Learning (CE&SL) across the Disciplines"



#### Introduction

This report summarizes high-level consensus recommendations from a two-day Mapping Educational Challenges (MECha) workshop at the University of Arizona, held in June 2021, and dedicated to Civic Engagement and Service-Learning (CE&SL) in higher education teaching and learning. A multidisciplin section of 30 faculty and staff spanning 11 academic colleges and six units/offices discussed CE&SL in to the university learning experience. The discussion was structured around the following questions:



- What about for our local communities and community partnerships? Why does it matter for as a land grant and an HSI institution?
- What are ethical considerations that must be addressed when developing CE&SL opportunities for students, especially when considering the community, the curriculum, and the institution?
- How do we make our commitment to CE&SL and social justice explicit in the university learning experience (classes, curriculum, modes of engagement, teaching approaches, clinics, degree work)?
- What explicit institutional commitments to CE&SL are needed to support the work we envision?

The workshop, organized and hosted by the Center for University Education Scholarship (CUES) at the University of Arizona, built upon a university-wide dual keynote event hosted by CUES and the W.A. Franke Honors College, in which two national speakers and four Unizona faculty discussants engaged in dialogue on civic engagement and service learning in university education. Both events and this report serve to inform the 2022 CUES Spanning Boundaries Challenge grant on CE&SL across disciplines<sup>5</sup> and, more generally, efforts on the content, form, and relevance of CE&SL in higher education teaching and learning.

Resources and readings discussed during the workshop, and organizing committee member bios appear at the end of the report.

#### Framing Challeng

The terms Civic Engagement (CE) and Service Learning (SL) have been utilized in educational circles for decades. Yet the principles and ideologies behind each term have often been altered, set aside, and not properly embodied in university initiatives around CE&SL. This has resulted not only in community distrust of universities' CE&SL efforts, but also in students' lack of confidence in the value of CE&SL, and faculty's disillusionment with CE&SL.
